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001 accolade *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

An award or privilege granted as a special honor or acknowledgment of merit

The researcher received the highest **accolade** in her field for groundbreaking work in genetics.

MEMORY CUE: An accolade is applause made tangible as a medal or honor.

002 acerbic *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Sharp and forthright in speech or manner; biting; caustic

The critic's **acerbic** review of the opera spared neither the director's vision nor the lead soprano's performance.

MEMORY CUE: Acerbic words feel acidic: sharp enough to sting the listener.

003 acquisition *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

The purchase of a company, asset, resource, or controlling ownership interest.

The **acquisition** gave the retailer access to a delivery network that would have taken years to build.

MEMORY CUE: During an acquisition, one company acquires and brings another business under its ownership.

004 admonished *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Warned or reprimanded firmly; urged earnestly

The judge **admonished** the attorney for repeatedly interrupting opposing counsel during cross-examination.

MEMORY CUE: An admonished student hears a firm warning meant to correct behavior.

005 allocation *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

The act of distributing limited resources among competing purposes or recipients.

The budget **allocation** favored maintenance because neglected equipment threatened to interrupt production across several departments.

MEMORY CUE: Allocation divides one resource pie into labeled slices for different uses.

006 amortization *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

The gradual reduction or allocation of a debt or intangible asset's amount over time.

The loan's **amortization** schedule showed how each monthly payment reduced principal as well as interest.

MEMORY CUE: Amortization slices one large amount into a timed row of smaller accounting portions.

007 appeasing *verb (present participle)*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Pacifying or placating by acceding to demands; bringing peace to

Appeasing the rival faction only emboldened them to make more extreme demands in subsequent negotiations.

MEMORY CUE: Appeasing an angry person means offering peace until hostility settles.

008 approbation *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Approval or praise; official sanction

The young artist sought the **approbation** of the established critics.

MEMORY CUE: Approbation sounds like approval because it is official praise or approval.

009 assuage *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To make an unpleasant feeling less intense; to satisfy or relieve

Nothing could **assuage** his guilt over the error that had cost the company millions.

MEMORY CUE: Assuage a burning worry by pouring soothing relief over it.

010 calumny *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

The making of false and defamatory statements about someone; slander

The candidate accused her opponent of spreading **calumny** to damage her reputation.

MEMORY CUE: Calumny is a calculated falsehood thrown to stain someone's reputation.

011 castigate *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To reprimand someone severely; to criticize harshly

The editorial **castigated** the government for its slow response to the crisis.

MEMORY CUE: A severe verbal lash represents castigating someone with harsh reprimand.

012 caustic *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Sarcastic in a scathing and bitter way; capable of burning or corroding

Her **caustic** review of the novel left its author devastated.

MEMORY CUE: Caustic acid burns a surface; caustic words burn through bitter criticism.

013 censure *verb/noun***EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE**

To express severe disapproval of, especially in a formal statement

The ethics committee voted to **censure** the senator for violating campaign finance rules.

MEMORY CUE: Formal severe disapproval arrives as a red CENSURED stamp.

014 compelling *adjective***EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE**

Evoking interest or attention in a powerfully irresistible way

The documentary presents a **compelling** case that systemic reforms are needed in the criminal justice system.

MEMORY CUE: A compelling idea is a magnet for attention: it pulls the audience in and convinces them.

015 complimentary *adjective***EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE**

Expressing praise and admiration

The review was almost entirely **complimentary**, praising the author's prose, structure, and depth of research.

MEMORY CUE: Complimentary words deliver a compliment filled with praise.

016 concession *noun***EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE**

Something conceded or acknowledged, especially in an argument, while maintaining the overall position

The author's **concession** that her earlier model was flawed lent credibility to her revised theory.

MEMORY CUE: A concession yields one point without surrendering the entire argument.

017 condone *verb***EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE**

To accept or allow behavior that is considered morally wrong or offensive

The university refused to **condone** the use of artificial intelligence to produce student essays.

MEMORY CUE: To condone wrongdoing is to let it pass as acceptable.

018 conviction *noun***EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE**

A firmly held belief or opinion

She argued with such **conviction** that even her skeptics found themselves reconsidering long-held assumptions.

MEMORY CUE: A conviction is a belief held firmly enough to withstand pressure.

019 deferential *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Showing deference; respectful and yielding to the judgment of another

The junior diplomat's **deferential** manner during the negotiations concealed a sharp tactical mind.

MEMORY CUE: A deferential speaker bows respectfully to someone else's authority or judgment.

020 denounce *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To publicly declare to be wrong or evil; to condemn openly

Human rights organizations **denounced** the government's use of force against peaceful demonstrators.

MEMORY CUE: Denounce wrongdoing by declaring it publicly beneath a loud WRONG sign.

021 deprecate *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To express disapproval of; to belittle

She tended to **deprecate** her own achievements, attributing her success to luck.

MEMORY CUE: A downward red thumb expresses deprecation and disapproval.

022 depreciation *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

The allocation of a tangible asset's cost over its useful life, reflecting use and aging.

Annual **depreciation** spread the machine's purchase cost across the years in which it helped produce goods.

MEMORY CUE: Depreciation lowers a machine's book-value staircase one accounting period at a time.

023 deride *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To express contempt for; to ridicule or mock

Critics **derided** the proposal as impractical and hopelessly idealistic.

MEMORY CUE: Derision points and laughs in order to express contempt.

024 diatribe *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

A forceful and bitter verbal attack against someone or something

The columnist launched a **diatribe** against the proposed legislation.

MEMORY CUE: A diatribe is a long, forceful stream of bitter verbal attack.

025 disapprobation *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Strong disapproval, typically on moral grounds

The community expressed its **disapprobation** of the proposal by attending the town hall meeting in record numbers.

MEMORY CUE: Disapprobation delivers a stern moral thumbs-down against wrongful conduct.

026 disdain *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

The feeling that someone or something is unworthy of consideration; contempt

The aristocrat made no effort to conceal her **disdain** for what she considered the vulgarity of commercial art.

MEMORY CUE: Disdain turns up its nose and throws away the respect medal.

027 disparaged *verb (past tense)*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Regarded or represented as being of little worth; belittled

The architect's contemporaries **disparaged** his designs as impractical, but today his buildings are celebrated as visionary.

MEMORY CUE: A disparaged achievement is talked down as though worth very little.

028 encomium *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly

The biography reads more like an **encomium** than a balanced account of the leader's life.

MEMORY CUE: An encomium is praise expanded into an entire speech or essay.

029 endorsement *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

The act of approving, supporting, or sustaining

The scientist's **endorsement** of the new vaccine carried enormous weight with a skeptical public.

MEMORY CUE: An endorsement adds a public stamp of approval and support.

030 excoriating *verb (present participle)*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Criticizing severely; censuring harshly

The editorial delivered an **excoriating** critique of the government's failure to prepare for the pandemic.

MEMORY CUE: An excoriating review verbally strips the target with severe criticism.

031 exemplary *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Serving as a desirable model; representing the best of its kind

The school's **exemplary** test scores attracted national attention and prompted other districts to study its methods.

MEMORY CUE: An exemplary model stands on the standard's highest pedestal for others to copy.

032 extol *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To praise enthusiastically

The review **extolled** the novel's innovative structure and richly drawn characters.

MEMORY CUE: To extol is to lift someone high on a tower of enthusiastic praise.

033 extolled *verb (past tense)*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Praised enthusiastically and at length

The poet was **extolled** by contemporaries as the voice of a generation, though later critics were less generous.

MEMORY CUE: The tribute extolled the hero with lengthy, enthusiastic praise.

034 goaded *verb (past tense)*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Provoked or annoyed to stimulate some action or reaction

Goaded by the opposition's taunts, the usually composed minister made an intemperate remark she later regretted.

MEMORY CUE: A pointed goad provoked the reluctant animal into action.

035 gratuitous *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Uncalled for; lacking good reason; unwarranted

The reviewer criticized the film for its **gratuitous** violence, which added nothing to the plot.

MEMORY CUE: A gratuitous insult arrives uncalled for and without good reason.

036 hedged *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Qualified or limited with conditions or restrictions; cautiously stated

The scientist's **hedged** conclusions—full of qualifiers and caveats—reflected the genuine uncertainty of the data.

MEMORY CUE: A hedged claim builds cautious qualifications around its risky central statement.

037 invective *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Insulting, abusive, or highly critical language

The debate devolved into personal **invective** rather than substantive policy discussion.

MEMORY CUE: Invective throws verbal stones made of insults and abusive criticism.

038 lambasting *verb (present participle)*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Criticizing harshly; attacking verbally with great force

The editorial spent three columns **lambasting** the governor's record on education, sparing no detail.

MEMORY CUE: Lambasting pounds a target with forceful, harsh verbal criticism.

039 laud *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To praise highly; to extol

Critics were quick to **laud** the director's bold visual style, though some found the screenplay lacking.

MEMORY CUE: Laud an achievement by lifting it high on a tower of praise.

040 laudable *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Deserving praise and commendation

While the goals of the initiative are **laudable**, the execution has been deeply flawed.

MEMORY CUE: A laudable achievement deserves a raised trophy of praise.

041 mollify *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To appease the anger or anxiety of someone; to calm or soothe

The company offered full refunds in an attempt to **mollify** dissatisfied customers.

MEMORY CUE: Mollify an angry person by lowering the heat with calm reassurance.

042 opprobrium *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Harsh criticism or censure; public disgrace arising from shameful conduct

The politician faced widespread **opprobrium** after the scandal became public.

MEMORY CUE: Opprobrium is public shame delivered through harsh collective condemnation.

043 palatable *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Acceptable or satisfactory; pleasant to taste

The committee revised the proposal to make it more **palatable** to the opposition.

MEMORY CUE: A palatable proposal is easy enough for the mind or palate to accept.

044 productivity *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

The amount of useful output produced from a given quantity of labor, time, or resources.

New scheduling software increased **productivity** because technicians completed more repairs during the same number of hours.

MEMORY CUE: Productivity is the output pile produced from one fixed basket of inputs.

045 propitiate *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To win or regain the favor of someone by doing something that pleases them

The company offered generous severance packages to **propitiate** the laid-off workers.

MEMORY CUE: To propitiate an angry person, offer something pleasing to regain favor.

046 rebuke *verb/noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To express sharp disapproval or criticism of someone

The supervisor's public **rebuke** of the employee was considered unnecessarily harsh.

MEMORY CUE: A rebuke is a sharp verbal red mark of disapproval.

047 revered *verb (past tense)*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Felt deep respect or admiration for

The philosopher was **revered** by students and colleagues alike for both his intellectual brilliance and his personal integrity.

MEMORY CUE: A revered teacher is held high in deep respect and admiration.

048 reverence *noun*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Deep respect and admiration

The **reverence** with which the community regarded the ancient forest made the logging proposal especially controversial.

MEMORY CUE: Reverence bows quietly before someone or something held in deep respect.

049 sardonic *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Grimly mocking or cynical; disdainfully humorous

His **sardonic** commentary on the proceedings amused some but offended many.

MEMORY CUE: A sardonic smile bends humor into grim, disdainful mockery.

050 scathing *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Witheringly harsh; severely critical

The peer reviewer's **scathing** critique of the manuscript identified fundamental flaws in the study's experimental design.

MEMORY CUE: A scathing review feels hot enough to wither its target.

051 unsparing *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Mercilessly severe; showing no mercy or restraint

The autobiography is **unsparing** in its self-criticism, offering no excuses for the mistakes the author made.

MEMORY CUE: Unsparing criticism holds nothing back and shows no mercy.

052 venerate *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To regard with great respect; to revere

The community **venerated** the founder, preserving her home as a historic landmark.

MEMORY CUE: Venerate a figure by bowing before a pedestal of great respect.

053 vilify *verb*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

To speak or write about in an abusively disparaging manner; to defame

The press campaign sought to **vilify** the opposition candidate with unsubstantiated accusations.

MEMORY CUE: Vilify someone by covering their name with abusive, degrading words.

054 vitriolic *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Filled with bitter criticism or malice; caustic and hostile

The **vitriolic** exchange between the two candidates dominated the evening news.

MEMORY CUE: Vitriolic criticism burns like acid with bitter hostility.

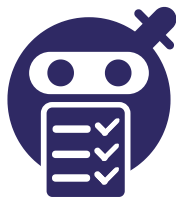
055 withering *adjective*

EVALUATION & PERFORMANCE

Devastating; intended to make someone feel mortified or humiliated; intensely destructive

The critic delivered a **withering** assessment of the novel, calling it the most self-indulgent book of the year.

MEMORY CUE: A withering rebuke makes confidence shrivel under devastating force.
